Broeigrond: Fertile Ground for Golden Regrets is a multidisciplinary exhibition by Ronél de Jager, inspired by the Karoo landscape, geology, infrared photographic process and cosmology.

In this series of works, the artist constructs fictionalised landscapes which oscillate between the familiar and the alien; De Jager constructs artifacts of paintings, light-boxes, glass orbs with brass and copper electroplated flora and time-lapse film gathered from previous expeditions in the Karoo.

These artifacts present fertile landscapes with an energy potential, at the cusp of its revelation; they incubate our imagined future, thoughts and potential regrets. Beginning as a photographic process of experimentation, De Jager, uses infrared photography to investigate the characteristics of the landscape and found flora. These flora represent the biota of a specific landscape, period and people. These are then re-interrogated in her studio as she translates this into paintings and multimedia works. These images are painted as part of a meditative process of 'searching', contemplating these notions of latent landscapes.

Like a heat seeker the infrared analyses its components, tapping into magnetic fields which we cannot see as humans, providing us some kind of alternative universe where we may see these energetic fields and imagined futures through the landscape. It is this very mediation between scientific process and fine art object where De Jager actively teleports her viewer.


These artifacts consider time and space and play on the notions of memory as transcendental, ephemeral and intangible.

As an alter ego exists so it seems De Jager wishes to reconstruct herself through the reconstruction of these familiar spaces. The landscape becomes her internal universe; the infrared becomes the electromagnetic wave seeker, searching for the obscure, inspecting within the unknown.






Sea of Flames. 2017. Oil on canvas, 90 x 120 cm




Alluvium I




Alluvium III 2017 Oil on canvas 90 x 60 cm






Ring of Fire. 2017. Oil on canvas behind digital print on perspex in custom angled frame, 120 x 180 x 15 cm















Aeon IV (series). 2017. Oil & mixed media on board, 40,7 x 60 cm






Aeon VI (series). 2017. Oil & mixed media on board, 40,7 x 60 cm










Aeon Series I - XV. 2017. Oil & mixed media on board, dimensions variable





Citizen of Glass, experiments with electroplating processes, encapsulating Karoo flora in glass blown spheres formed from molten glass; born from fire, which gives humans power to create or destroy.

In the electroplating process, the object is submerged into a chemical solution which transfers nano metal particles onto the flora, dendritic metallic crystals form on the edges of the surface as the organic object is charged with electricity, forming new fractal patterns.

If the flora represents a specific biota of our South African landscape then these dendritic forms represent De Jager's experiment as she morphs time and form to reimagine a future, shaping a new identity. This encapsulated object, held by a string references the incubated tension in our country and its future.











Citizen of Glass: Venus








Citizen of Glass: Mars 2017





Ronel de Jager (1985, Johannesburg) studied BTech Fine Arts at Tshwane University of Technology, where she obtained distinctions in Painting and Printmaking in her final year (2006).

The artist's work has featured in a number of curated group exhibitions, including amongst others *Interrupted* (UJ Gallery, 2013); *No Place Like Now* (Lovell Gallery, 2013); *Point of Departure* (Lizamore & Assoc. Gallery, 2014); *Macabre* (Under Culture Contemporary, 2015); *Stellar* (Salon91, 2015); *Winter is Coming* (Equus Gallery, 2015); *For What It's Worth* (No End Contemporary, 2016) and more recently *Spaces Between Maps* (ABSA Gallery, KKNK Festival, 2016).

De Jager's début solo exhibition (2014 & 2015) A.M. After Midnight was a multi-media, multi-spatial exhibition which unfolded in three parts in a series of diverse spaces with the first A Prelude hosted by ROOM Gallery & Projects in Braamfontein, Johannesburg.

The second installment of the exhibition, *An Interlude*, was one of the featured installations at the 2014 Turbine Art Fair. With both these exhibitions culminating in the third and final part (hosted by Lizamore & Associates gallery, Johannesburg). As each new element of the project is unveiled, previous incarnations exist in memory. Across this evolving body of work, the recording and capturing of light acts as a register of moments of silence, movement, flux, transition and metamorphosis.

Lizamore & Associates gallery presented her work at the Turbine Art Fair in 2013 to 2016 - with *An Interlude* in 2014 as a featured solo project - as well as at the Cape Town Art Fair (2015). She has been a regular finalist in national art competitions such as *Absa L'Atelier Art Awards* (2008, 2013 and 2015), *Sasol New Signatures* (in 2007, 2008 and 2010) and *Thami Mnyele Fine Arts Awards* (in 2006 to 2016).

The artist's works are included in a number of private collections, locally and internationally, as well as in the corporate art collections of Sasol, Telkom, Spier, Hollard, Rand Merchant Bank, Nando's International & the permanent collection of the South African National Library.

Although De Jager does not restrict herself to one medium - she also works comfortably across disciplines and media in installation, photography, video and painting. Experimenting with photographic practices to capture 'moments', which De Jager memorialises through the transient process of painting; melding light, space and time.

The artist currently resides and works from her studio in Parkwood, Johannesburg, South Africa.
